"Well, there's a little more to it than that," said Mrs. Evans. "You'll start by being a part of a ceremony called the rite of election. That's what we're going to talk about today."




Are you excited about saying "yes" to Jesus? Are you nervous? Why?

Jesus Is Calling

Jesus chose people who would walk with him and help him in his work. But not everyone Jesus called said "yes."

There was a rich young man who wanted to walk

with Jesus. Jesus told the young man that he had to sell all his possessions and give the money to the poor. The man didn't want to give everything away. So he said "no." This made Jesus sad (Mark 10:17–31).



How would you feel if Jesus asked you to give everything away?

Why might someone say "no" to giving their things away? Why might someone say "yes"?

Another man was called to follow Jesus. This man told Jesus he would join him later, after his father died. This man wanted to follow Jesus but said, "Not yet" (Luke 9:57–62).

The twelve people Jesus called to follow him and lead his Church were called the apostles. All Jesus' followers are called disciples. Now that you're ready to say "yes" to Jesus, you will become a disciple, too!

The disciples had a lot to look forward to by staying with Jesus. He was the Messiah. He promised people everlasting life. But following Jesus wasn't easy. Jesus was tortured and killed. Many of his followers would be, too.

Rite of Election


We believe that Jesus calls us to be his followers. As followers of Jesus, we have to follow God's

rules and live like Jesus wants us to. Jesus doesn't force us to be his followers. He invites us. It's up to us to accept his invitation. The Catholic Church has a special rite, or ceremony, for accepting Jesus' invitation. It is called the **rite of election**,



and it will take place at a special Mass. This rite is your chance to choose Jesus and let him know you're willing to live your life as he wants you to.

During the rite of election, you will be called to the front of church with your catechist, who will tell everyone that you want to follow Jesus. Then



the priest will ask the people if they accept your decision. When they say "yes" to you, your name will be written in a book called the **Book of the Elect**. This is a very important day in your journey to Jesus and the Church! It is public recognition of your desire to join the Church and live like Jesus!
