


# **Making Tough Decisions**

Tomás didn't know what to do. He'd promised his grandpa he'd work at his store after school. But as he was leaving, one of his friends asked him to come play soccer.

## **Making Difficult Decisions**

It's not always easy to make decisions. Making a choice between one thing and another is called **discernment**. Discernment means "choosing the right way." Saint Ignatius Loyola created a step-by-step process to help people make good choices. As you go through each step, think about what Tomás should decide or think of a decision you have to make.

# Step 1 State your problem clearly and ask God for help.

Before you can make a decision, you have to know what you're deciding. Think about what's going on. Then clearly state what you're trying to decide. You can say it out loud or write it down. Once you have that, pray for God to guide you as you decide. God will guide you through every step.

# **Step 2**List the pros and cons of each decision.

Think about the problems (cons) that might arise. You might also want to talk to someone you trust who isn't involved. They might be able to see things about the decision you can't.


